May 14, 2018—The Astronauts on the International Space Station paid TASM a visit via Skype, allowing 20 selected students from several schools to participate in this special occasion. Students came from various school districts such as Mayo, Booker T. Washington, Okmulgee, and even home school to ask the astronauts their chosen questions.

Richard Arnold and Andrew Feustel, the two astronauts aboard the international space station, answered many questions ranging from life as an astronaut, to what they do when they get bored, to how they do their laundry, to what do they eat, and why they became astronauts.

Over 40 people attended the live NASA downlink to witness and support these 20 children ask their questions, including parents, teachers, grandparents, and members of media networks.

“It was a well-attended celebration of man’s accomplishments and STEM learning”, says Tonya Blansett, Executive Director of TASM, “What better ways to celebrate man’s accomplishments than with live conversation with live astronauts.”





Did You Know?

You can hardly make it through into the parking lot without noticing the enormous commercial aircraft, with the American Airlines symbols on it, in front of the Tulsa Air and Space Museum & Planetarium (TASM). This is our MD-80 Discovery Center, but did you know that it is more than just a display?

TASM's MD-80 was donated to the museum in 2014 by American Airlines. This aircraft flew continually for 26 years, making about 39,968 flights covering about 38 million miles and carrying approximately 5.5 million passengers.

While some of this aircraft has been kept in its original form/condition, the MD-80 Discovery Center has been remodeled inside in order to become a learning environment. During many school field trips, and at specific times throughout the day, groups of up to 28 visitors/students at a time can enter the flight theater inside the MD-80.

Inside the MD-80 lies a world of adventure and learning of the history of aircrafts, some hologram displays, and much more! The MD-80 Discovery Center can also be used to book events such as birthday parties and other small gatherings.
